Parish President addresses critical need for drainage renewal funding

To the Residents of West Baton Rouge Parish,

As you know, the renewal of the dedicated drainage tax failed in a March election and is set to expire. We will again ask voters to renew this tax in an upcoming election. This is not a new tax; it is a continuation of what has long supported our drainage efforts.

Our dedicated drainage tax is critical to maintain, improve, and expand the drainage systems that protect our homes, roads, businesses, and public spaces from the increasingly severe impacts of storms and flooding. With our unique geographic challenges, a modern and well-maintained drainage infrastructure is not a luxury—it is a necessity.

Without this renewal by you, we risk losing the ability to:

- · Maintain and upgrade vital drainage canals.
- Respond promptly to emergency flooding situations.
- Plan and invest in long-term infrastructure that mitigates flood risks.
- Comply with state and federal regulations tied to storm water and drainage management.

We have made substantial progress, including GIS mapping of our drainage systems, and we are in the process of incorporating flood gauges that will help us predict potential problem areas before a major rain event occurs. There is more work to be done. Aging infrastructure, heavier rainfall events, and increasing demands on our systems require that we remain proactive and prepared.

Let me be clear—failure to renew this tax would significantly set us back, not just in the drainage area but all departments of our parish because more limited drainage projects would have to be funded out of our General Fund. It would delay critical projects, reduce our responsiveness during storms, and ultimately increase costs in the long term. Most importantly, it would put homes, property, and lives at greater risk.

I urge every resident to consider what's at stake and to make your voice heard. This tax renewal is an investment in the safety and future of West Baton Rouge Parish. With your continued support, we can ensure that our drainage systems remain strong, reliable, and capable of meeting the needs of our community for generations to come.

WBR LIBRARY

Library to again ask for renewal of property tax

On March 29, 2025, voters rejected the RENEWAL of a 4.1 mill tax to fund the West Baton Rouge Parish Library. This tax is the only funding for the library. It funds all library operations, including the Bookmobile, Storytimes, public computers, books, magazines, newspapers, DVDs, and daily services to the public. Without this revenue, the West Baton Rouge Library will be forced to close.

Director Tamie Martin stated that the Library is funded through 2025. She said that the Library will put the tax renewal back on the ballot on November 15, 2025. She said she will hold public meetings to answer any questions voters may have about the Library or the tax. Copies of the Library budgets, audits, and Board meeting minutes are available on the Library website, www.wbrpl.com.

When asked how much taxpayers contribute for the Library, Martin said a home with an appraised value of \$150,000 with the homestead exemption pays only \$30 per year to support the Library. She compared that figure to the cost of a single book or one month of streaming platforms.

Martin also said that she is available to speak to groups and for individual conversations with anyone who has questions or concerns about how the Library utilizes

WBR fire rating improves; helps property owner insurance costs

West Baton Rouge Parish's fire rating has improved to a Class 3! This means all property owners in the parish will receive savings on homeowners and commercial insurance!

This significant improvement was the result of several factors:

- consolidating all parish fire departments into one department. Individual department ratings were 4-6. The lower the rating the better.
- Improved water supply and hydrant flow capacity in various areas of the parish.
- Increased training

The parish-wide Fire Department has also resulted in better accountability to taxpayers, improved fire response, and data collection for future fire protection improvements. Had the individual fire departments continued, several would have had worse fire ratings in the coming years because of the stringent requirements of the comprehensive fire rating reviews.

Meanwhile, the WBR Fire Department EMS system is having remarkable success in responding to medical emergencies in the parish. "We are continually building improved response times and delivering critical advanced life support by paramedics, and the crossover training of our employees as firefighters has proved very beneficial," said Fire Chief Butch Browning.

The fire department EMS has transported 246 emergency patients between October 2024 and January, 2025, including numerous critical patients. It was operating two units a day, and as of March, is operating 3 units a day. Average response time is 9 minutes. Medic units have responded to seven structure fires, which added four firefighters for these fires due to cross-training.

PROJECT UPDATES

Court Street Sidewalk Project:

Project has been recommended by Parish to be split into two phases: Phase 1: 10' wide asphalt sidewalk starts near Court Street and LA 415 intersection and heads east before ending just east of S. 12th Street. Phase 2: 5' wide asphalt sidewalk starts at the end of Phase 1 and heads east across LA 1 to connect to an existing sidewalk on Court Street. This will be a 5' wide asphalt sidewalk. Phase 1 construction will begin by the end of 2025.

LA 1 Intracoastal Waterway Bridge Replacement:

The 970 day construction period began on April 14. Southbound traffic movements will stay the same. Northbound LA 1 to I-10 traffic will be moved from the existing northbound bridge to the new southbound bridge sometime in June. This means all LA 1 traffic will use the new southbound bridge for an extended period of time. Driver's will drive on temporary roadway sections to get onto the new bridge and to head east on I-10 to Baton Rouge.

New water well:

Construction of a 2nd water well located at the WBR Multipurpose Arena at 141 Turner is set to begin in June. Funding for the second well will come from a combination of ARPA funds and WBR Utilities budget. This new well will serve as a backup to Arena Well #1 currently in service now, and will provide redundancy in our water system infrastructure. The contractor, Layne Christensen, has a project construction time line of 450 days.

Foster, who began performing gigs in 2021 and writes his own music, has struck a chord with audiences thanks to his heartfelt performances and authentic style.


"We are thrilled with John's success, and the limelight he has placed on our town," said Addis Mayor David Toups.

Slight increase in sewer service fee required by sewer grant program

Brusly residents will see a small \$1.16 increase in their sewer service fee beginning with the June bill. The town was required to increase all sewer customer fees due to the \$4.5 million in grants the town received for major upgrades to the wastewater system.

Rates for residential customers will go from a flat rate of \$20.84 to a flat rate of \$22. The town also increased rates for commercial customers.

"These federal grants now require municipalities to have a rate analysis performed to show that the rates charged can sustain the wastewater system over time, and if the rates are not sufficient the town must increase them to match the recommendations of the analysis," explained Mayor Scot Rhodes. "In the past, the government had been providing these big grants to municipalities to upgrade their wastewater system, and after they got the upgrades the municipalities weren't maintaining the systems because they weren't charging enough, so they just got into disrepair again."

Brusly's rate analysis by the La. Rural Water Association was conducted in October of 2024, and it recommended a rate increase to meet the required sustainability factor. The Town Council approved the rate increase at its March meeting.

The town is spending a total of \$5.7 million on upgrades to the wastewater system in three phases of work with \$4.5 million of that coming from grants, and the town adding \$1.2 million. Two phases have been completed, and Phase 3 will be underway before the end of 2025.

"The wastewater system dates back to the early 1980s, and this is the first major upgrade of the system since that time," said Mayor Rhodes. "The good news is that we are being told that with these improvements, the town's wastewater treatment system should not need another major overhaul for 20 years."



Sewer system improvements listed

The town wastewater treatment improvements include:

Phase 1: Adding a second force main to the sewer treatment facility: The Live Oak Lift Station is the drainage catch all for the entire Town of Brusly. All sewerage and rain infiltration go to this station and

is pumped almost one mile west to the sewer ponds. A second force main was added to help get sewerage out of town and into the sewer pond quickly.

Phase 2: Upgrading 2 lift stations: The South LaBauve lift station and Bourgeois Street lift station have been upgraded to new Smith & Loveless above ground pumps, along with all the electrical stations. These pumps will be easier to maintain, and the town will no longer have to hoist submersible pumps from the raw sewerage to work on them, providing a much more sanitary and maintenance-free system.

Phase 3: Replacing the old duckweed system at the sewer treatment facility: The entire surface of Cell 3 will get a new modular cover system that will help with heat retention, odor control, algae elimination, TSS removal and wildlife mitigation. This will replace the LEMNA duckweed that crews must manually remove three to four times a year.

With the cover, the town will no longer spend 80 work hours quarterly harvesting duckweed, and will not have constant repair on an antiquated boat used for that purpose. In addition, two LEMNA polishing reactors will be installed between the effluent of Cell 3 and the chlorine contact chamber, which effectively removes ammonia and polishes BOD, two things the town must sample every week.

Educators to get new tools for kids in trouble at school

District Attorney Tony Clayton is continuing a multi-pronged approach to helping young people before they get into serious trouble by committing crimes.

His most recent effort is offering free online courses for students who are being put in detention, are causing disruptions in class, or have been truant. The courses are being developed now and will be offered to all Pointe Coupee, Iberville,

and West Baton Rouge schools for next school year in August.

They will include courses on conflict resolution, effective decision making, anti-bullying and hazing, vaping/drugs, and financial responsibility. The DA's Office is working with Justice Learning Systems (JLS) to develop the courses.

The DA's Office hosted a luncheon with the education leaders of all three school districts and private schools in January to explain the program and get their feedback.

"We have made all of our juvenile-focused courses, such as antibullying, vaping and truancy education, available to the DA's office to offer to schools, but we are also working on constructing a new course that will be specifically for the schools in the 18th JDC," said David Burton of JLS. "This course will have elements of conflict resolution and effective decision making, but will also feature more regional materials such as videos of local mentors talking directly to the students."

"Giving our educators tools that will help our youth before they get into trouble with the criminal justice system is a pro-active approach to reducing youth crime and violence."

"We are thankful to have another resource we can use to educate our families on the importance of attendance in student academic success," said WBR Schools Superintendent Chandler Smith. "These courses can be incorporated into our alternative learning program, as well as other school level programs."

Funding for this program was made possible by the DA's Office sales tax that voters approved last year. He promised before the tax election to use a portion of the proceeds on programs to reduce youth crime. He has already provided \$50,000 to Families in Need of Services (FINS), \$25,000 to the 18th Judicial District Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) Program, and \$25,000 to the Child Advocacy Center.

"We will continue working to help our youths and direct them to positive lives and futures. It helps them and our communities!" said DA Clayton.

Why are Assessor's Office employees on my property?



If you've recently started or completed a new home or commercial building, or done an addition to your home or commercial building, it is likely you have received or will receive a visit from a Deputy Assessor employed by the West Baton Rouge Parish Assessor's Office.

Why? "The Assessor's Office is required by Louisiana Statute RS 47:1958 to make site visits to every taxable property or tract of land in the parish. These site visits afford our office the opportunity to collect the information necessary to fairly and equitably assess all properties in the parish," explained Assessor Chris Guerin

Property owners are typically required to obtain a permit from the parish or municipality where the property is located before starting a new construction or addition project. The Assessor's Office is notified by the parish and municipalities of the permits issued by those agencies. "In the past our Deputy Assessors made site visits to new construction and addition projects only in the spring and fall, but with the increased level of construction activity in the parish they are now visiting project sites on a year round basis," Guerin explained.

Barry Brewer and Alex Angrisano hold the positions of Deputy Assessors responsible for collecting the necessary data in the field enabling the Assessor's Office to fairly and equitably assess all properties in the parish. "They go on site to every project with laptops and tape measures in hand, collect the exterior dimensions of the homes and/or commercial buildings as well as many other attributes of the project (#stories, #baths, building height, etc.) and report the information back to our office," Guerin said.

It is standard procedure for the Deputy Assessors to knock on the door of the property upon arrival and identify themselves, but because these site visits are done during working hours many times no one is home. If no one answers, they will collect as much data on the property as possible and leave. Additionally, if no one is home or if the Deputy Assessors are unable to access a property due to locked gates, protective dogs, etc., they may leave a door hanger on site requesting the owner of the property contact the Assessor's Office.

Assessor Guerin says the Deputy Assessors travel in a well-marked white Ford Ranger truck, carry picture ID cards identifying them as staff of the Assessor's Office, and wear reflective vests with "WBR Assessor" prominently displayed on them so property owners can be assured they are properly authorized and on official business

"Because of our work schedule and the timing of construction projects, it may be some time after a project is completed before our Deputy Assessors can make their site visit," Guerin said. "This sometimes surprises property owners, but if anyone has questions about our presence on their property, please contact our office at 225-344-6777."

LOUISIANA'S DEEP DRAFT PORTS UNLOCKING TRADE POTENTIAL



STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS CAN LEAD TO MARITIME SUCCESS.

A recent report commissioned by Louisiana's five deep draft ports titled "Lower Mississippi River Commodity Analysis," highlights strategies to boost trade along one of the world's key waterways. Strategic partnerships, innovation, and emerging markets are central to Louisiana's maritime growth.

"This report validates the direction our port has been going in," said Jay Hardman, executive director of the Port of Greater Baton Rouge, "and points to more opportunities that can be pursued."

Identified growth markets include biofuels, LNG, wood pellets, cement, fertilizers, and container shipments. The report encourages continued cooperation among ports. Hardman cited the Baton Rouge-Port NOLA partnership, which moves containers from the capital to New Orleans for export, as a successful example.

"By working together," said Hardman, "we're not just moving cargo—we're building Louisiana's economic future, one shipment at a time."

School Board begins transformation of Cohn campus; PA Middle to become Early College Academy

The WBR Early College Academy is now in the works for students who plan on attending college to earn an Associate's Degree in Humanities or Sciences while still in high school, and at no cost to the students.

The Academy program began in 2024-25 school year, with the freshman class taking dual enrollment credits at their home campuses. They will begin taking their college courses at the Early College Academy for their 11th and 12th grade years.

The creation of this Academy includes moving Port Allen Middle School to the Cohn Elementary site and ravamping the site into Cohn Elementary and Middle School, while converting Port Allen Middle into the Early College Academy.

All work, including the Cohn project and the improvements at the other schools, is projected to cost \$32 million, and will be funded with a bond issue. Taxpayers will not be asked to pay any additional tax for these improvements, or other improvements being planned at other schools.

Work on the Cohn campus will begin this summer with a major construction project, including the following new facilities: elementary building, middle school building, library/media center, gym, and practice field. In addition, the cafeteria will be renovated and old buildings demolished. The projected opening of the new Cohn elementary wing will be August of 2026.

Port Allen Middle students will move to the Cohn Middle campus in January of 2027, and the Early College Academy will open in August 2027. The conversion will require some minor renovations to Port Allen Middle for the Early College Academy, and they will be done between January and August of 2027.

"The Early College Academy is another great opportunity for our students," said WBR Schools Superintendent Chandler Smith. "Students can get up to two years of college credit while in high school - at no cost. In addition, statistics show that the more dual enrollment credits a student has going into college, the more likely that student is to be successful and graduate from college. We are offering a spectrum of career opportunities to our students with the Early College and Career Academies. They have many opportunities to get ahead and move into successful careers faster with these programs."

Smith also noted that the Early College Academy was needed to provide the dual enrollment courses. "An organizational review of our system highly recommended combining the Cohn and Port Allen Middle campuses due to the low enrollment at those schools. By doing that and making Port Allen Middle the Early College Academy we provide benefits for all these students, and it allows us to hire the teachers needed for the Early College Academy courses. There is no way we could have done that at each high school in the parish."

OTHER IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED FOR SCHOOL CAMPUSES:

In addition to the transformation at Cohn, the School Board will also be implementing improvements at school campuses across the parish, including:

Brusly Upper Elementary - Summer 2025 - replace doors and windows; Summer 2026 - move office and other upgrades

Port Allen Elementary - Summer 2025 - roof replacement, multi-purpose floor replacement, upgrades to cafeteria, kitchen and multi-purpose space; Summer 2026 - office renovation

Brusly High & Port Allen High - Summer 2025 - conversion of fields to turf **Port Allen High** - Fall 2025 - athletic facility improvements

Brusly Middle School - Summer 2025 - roof replacement

Lukeville Elementary - Fall 2025 - gym/cafeteria improvements



Career Academy enrollment jumps

West Baton Rouge Schools' new Career Academy has taken off, with the number of students enrolled doubling each year. Following shows this increase in student enrollment:

2023-24 school year: 98 students enrolled 2024-25 school year: 237 students enrolled

2024-23 School year. 237 Students enfolied

2025-26 school year projected enrollment: 350 to 400 students
